
## **Derby (New Haven)**



Derby is a city in New Haven County with 2,009 residents age 65 or older. Compared to state average rates, older residents fared better on some healthy aging indicators with lower rates of asthma, fibromyalgia/chronic pain/fatigue, and glaucoma. However, they had higher rates of COPD, diabetes, hypertension, hypothyroidism, ischemic heart disease, liver disease, lung cancer, peripheral vascular disease, pressure ulcers, and opioid and tobacco use disorders. They are less likely to take the health promotion steps of getting the recommended hours of sleep and getting a shingles vaccine. Community resources to support healthy aging include 99 primary care providers, 4 nursing homes and a hospital within 5 miles; 35 home health agencies, 7 hospice agencies, a caregiver support group, a senior center, and 2 public libraries.

## TECHNICAL NOTES

For most indicators the community and state values are estimates derived from sample data. Thus, it is possible that some of the differences between state and community estimates may be due to chance associated with population sampling. We use the terms "Better" and "Worse" to highlight differences between community and state estimates that we are confident are not due to chance. "Better" is used where a higher/lower value has positive implications for the health of older residents. "Worse" is used where a higher/lower score has negative implications for the health of older people, and when the implication is unclear, we use an \*.

We balance two goals. First, we aim to report data at very local levels because we believe change is often locally driven. Second, we vowed to protect the privacy of the people providing the information reported. Thus, given the constraints of the data analyzed we used a hierarchical approach to reporting.
