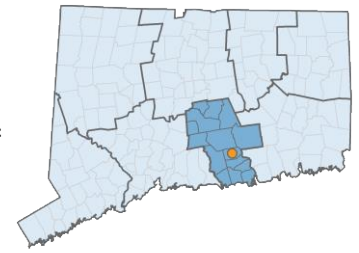


Chester (Middlesex)

Chester is a town in Middlesex County with 995 residents aged 65 and older. Compared to state average rates, older residents fare better on some healthy aging indicators with lower rates of benign prostatic hyperplasia, chronic kidney disease, congestive heart failure (CHF), diabetes, hypertension, and PTSD. However, they have a higher rate of cataract. Older residents in Middlesex County varied in obtaining preventive health screenings: residents 18 and older got annual physical exams (79.1%) and annual dental exams (74.4%), while 56.1% of men and 47.6% of women 65 and older completed all CDC recommended vaccinations and cancer screenings. Community resources to support healthy aging include one assisted living facility, one primary care provider, two skilled nursing facilities, one senior center, and one public library. Chester is a designated AARP Age-Friendly Community.

TECHNICAL NOTES

*For more information on data sources, measures, and methodology used in the 2025 Connecticut Healthy Aging Data Report see our technical documentation at (healthyagingdatareports.org). For most indicators, the community and state values are estimates derived from sample data. Thus, it is possible that some of the differences between state and community estimates may be due to chance associated with population sampling. We use the terms “Better” and “Worse” to highlight differences between community and state estimates that we are confident are not due to chance. We balance two goals. First, we aim to report data at very local levels because we believe change is often locally driven. Second, we vowed to protect the privacy of the people providing the information reported. Thus, given the constraints of the data analyzed, we used a hierarchical approach to reporting.
