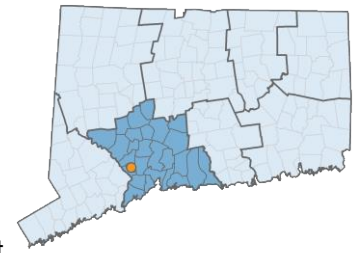


Ansonia (New Haven)

Ansonia is a city in New Haven County with 3,486 residents aged 65 and older. Compared to state average rates, older residents fare better on some healthy aging indicators with lower rates of cataract, glaucoma, and migraine. However, they have higher rates of anemia, chronic kidney disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), congestive heart failure (CHF), diabetes, peripheral vascular disease, pressure ulcer, and substance and tobacco use disorders. Older residents in New Haven County varied in obtaining preventive health screenings: residents 18 and older got annual physical exams (76.1%) and annual dental exams (70.4%), while 52% of men and 37.5% of women 65 and older completed all CDC recommended vaccinations and cancer screenings. Community resources to support healthy aging include ten primary care providers, two community health centers, one senior center, and one public library.

TECHNICAL NOTES

*For more information on data sources, measures, and methodology used in the 2025 Connecticut Healthy Aging Data Report see our technical documentation at (healthyagingdatareports.org). For most indicators, the community and state values are estimates derived from sample data. Thus, it is possible that some of the differences between state and community estimates may be due to chance associated with population sampling. We use the terms “Better” and “Worse” to highlight differences between community and state estimates that we are confident are not due to chance. We balance two goals. First, we aim to report data at very local levels because we believe change is often locally driven. Second, we vowed to protect the privacy of the people providing the information reported. Thus, given the constraints of the data analyzed, we used a hierarchical approach to reporting.
