## Hope (Knox)

Hope is a town in Knox County with 358 residents aged 65 and older. Compared to state average rates, older residents fare better on some healthy aging indicators with lower rates of anemia, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), diabetes, glaucoma, heart attack, ischemic heart disease, lung cancer, peripheral vascular disease, and tobacco use disorder. However, they have higher rates of cataract, fibromyalgia/chronic pain/fatigue, osteoarthritis/rheumatoid arthritis, and prostate cancer. Older residents in Knox County varied in obtaining preventive health screenings: residents 18 and older got annual physical exams (78%) and annual dental exams (70.3%), while 48.3% of men and 39% of women 65 and older completed all CDC recommended vaccinations and cancer screenings. A community resource to support healthy aging is their public library. Hope is a designated AARP Age-Friendly Community.

## **TECHNICAL NOTES**

\*For more information on data sources, measures, and methodology used in the 2025 Maine Healthy Aging Data Report see our technical documentation at (<u>healthyagingdatareports.org</u>). For most indicators, the community and state values are estimates derived from sample data. Thus, it is possible that some of the differences between state and community estimates may be due to chance associated with population sampling. We use the terms "Better" and "Worse" to highlight differences between community and state estimates that we are confident are <u>not</u> due to chance. We balance two goals. First, we aim to report data at very local levels because we believe change is often locally driven. Second, we vowed to protect the privacy of the people providing the information reported. Thus, given the constraints of the data analyzed, we used a hierarchical approach to reporting.
